




Kindergarten Readiness (2022-2023)

56% of incoming kindergarten students in Cuyahoga County are "not on track"




Kindergarten Readiness (2017-2018)



Percent of incoming kindergarten students who are "not on track"




Kindergarten Readiness (2022-2023)



Percent of incoming kindergarten students who are "not on track"




Children Served in Cuyahoga County





Books mailed to Children in Cuyahoga County












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Do you, or other family members, read to your child more often since you began receiving Imagination Library books?

Since you've been receiving Imagination Library books, is your child asking you to read to him/her more often?




Impacts of Receiving Books

Do you believe participation in Imagination Library is helping your child better prepare for Kindergarten?




Impacts of Receiving Books

How often do you find your child using words he/she has learned from the books you've read?




Impacts of Receiving Books

88% Of children were inspired to learn more about a topic after reading an Imagination Library book






When reading the books, parents and their children talked about the characters, plot and pictures in the book together:

~53% All of the time~41% Some of the time


How did you Learn about Imagination Library?

Books in the House

- For 66% of households, Imagination Library Books comprise half or more of all books in their homes.
- This number was 80% for lower income households.
- For 32% of all low income households, Imagination Library books were all or nearly all of the books in their households.






Preschool Capacity vs Enrollment (2019 - 2023) City of Cleveland (High Quality)





Preschool Capacity vs Enrollment (2019 - 2023) Cuyahoga County (High Quality)






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


All Age Groups Showed Improvement



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First Ring Suburbs




2022 5-Year Data 2017 5-Year Data






High Number of Adults Ages 25-44



■25-44 ■All Ages —% of 25-44




More Adults =<5th Grade Reading Level






High School Equivalencies and Test Sites

Ohio Aspire Overview

- Programs are funded through U.S. Department of Education Office of Career, Technical, and Adult Education (OCTAE). State awards are authorized under the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act (AEFLA), Title II of the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014.
- The State of Ohio provides a percentage match to support these efforts, allowing ODHE to award over \$26.5 million in funding to support local programs and allowable state leadership activities (such as Professional Development).



Ohio Aspire Overview

Services available at programs may include:

- •Basic skill education including math, reading, and writing skills
- •Adult Secondary Education/High School Equivalence (HSE) Preparation
- English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)
- Transition services helping students develop essential skills for employment and post-secondary
- •Life skills, employability skills, and digital literacy
- Integrated Education and Training
- •Workplace Education education services offered in collaboration with an employer to increase the productivity of the workforce

- •Corrections Education a partnership with a jail, detention center, community-based rehabilitation center, or other similar institution
- Distance Education enhancing learning using technology

BEST PRACTICES

- Offer student orientation with preliminary testing and program information
- Provide multiple methods for course delivery
 - In-person-flexible scheduling, such as night courses
 - Hybrid/online
- Provide English to Speakers of Other Language (ESOL) courses to expand enrollment opportunities.
- Build relationships with participants and check in regularly to encourage success both in the classroom and at home
